

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe in regular session this date January 8, 1940 that:

The law and order regulations under the Court of Indian Offenses be more rigidly enforced and that the Police Judge and associate judges and the Chief of Police and assistants are hereby notified that the Council demands increased and better service on the part of the Police. They are hereby instructed to visit the communities of their respective districts daily, if possible, and report offenses, make arrests in accordance with regulations and as instructed by the Police Judge and the Chief of Police. They are to see that reasonable discipline and order prevails in their respective districts. The Court is instructed to take a liberal view of Section 15, Chapter 1 and especially in the issuance of search warrants so that the police may not be at a disadvantage when they have reasonable grounds to believe that the various sections under Chapter 5, and especially Section 18 and 25 are being violated. The Court is also requested to make any suggestions for the modification of any of the police regulations for the consideration of the Council that will improve the Law and Order Department of the White Mountain Apache Tribe.

The foregoing resolution was this 8th day of January 1940 duly adopted by a vote of 7 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Fort Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Section (g) Article VI of the Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
