

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council some years past approved and assisted in the construction of a fish hatchery under certain agreements with the Fish and Wildlife Service whereby the hatchery with ponds, dwelling homes and other necessary buildings were constructed on Williams Creek, and

WHEREAS, the cottage occupied by the manager burned down some weeks ago, and

WHEREAS, the hatchery plant is an asset to the reservation in stocking the streams within the reservation and thus provides fish food for the Indians, and whites who buy permits, and also provides a market for crippled and worn out horses and other worthless stock, and additional labor for our people;

NOW THEREFORE be IT RESOLVED that the Tribal Council assist in the reconstruction of the above-mentioned cottage by donating such lumber as is available from our own Tribal Saw Mill to this project which we feel is an asset and benefit to the tribe.

The foregoing resolution was this 4th day of September 1945 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Section 1 (e) of Article 6 of the Constitution and By-Laws of the tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 18 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984)
