

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

Be it resolved by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that in order to encourage Indians to utilize local resources for their own benefit that members of the White Mountain Apache Tribe may cut fence posts and firewood for sale without being required to pay stumpage fees for such posts and wood; and

Be it further resolved that residents of the town of McNary may be granted permits to gather dead wood from the forest adjacent to McNary, such permits to be granted without stumpage charge if such wood is for the permittee's own use and not for sale; provided that if non-members of the tribe desire to obtain wood for sale that a stumpage fee shall be paid at the time the permit is obtained and if such sales come within the scope of the Indian traders regulations that such trader shall obtain a traders license as provided in said regulations.

The foregoing resolution was duly adopted on November 3, 1947, by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (c), of the constitution and by-laws of the tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 16, 1934 (48 Stat. 934).
