

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe to protect its workers and to prevent workman's compensation claims against the Tribe, and

WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe sponsors a juniper removal program and the work is done largely by hand and numerous workers receive cuts and wounds, and

WHEREAS, it is definitely known that the germ which causes tetanus or lockjaw is carried by horses and that it gains entrance in the human body through cuts and when established in the human body death almost invariably follows,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that all tribal members employed on Juniper Control Work be immunized against tetanus and request that the PHS Medical Officer In Charge set up special clinics for this immunization program.

The foregoing resolution was on November 5, 1956 duly adopted by a vote of \_\_\_ for and \_\_\_ against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (g) of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

Attached please find minutes for Council Meeting, November 5 and 6, 1956. On page 5, paragraph 4, the minutes refer to Resolutions number 56-52 and 56-53, amending Ordinance 13 and 18. These resolutions were passed by the Council as stated in the minutes. These resolutions are not being submitted with the minutes, because the Council decided to rewrite Ordinances number 13, 18 and 22. The Constitution and By-Laws of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, Article III, Section 2, requires all Ordinances be posted in each district for at least ten days before final action by the Council. The Council will rescind resolutions number 56-52 and 56-53 at this meeting on December 3, 1956, and pass the new resolutions dealing with range management, conservation, grazing and surplus horse control. The proposed ordinances are posted in the various districts and meetings have been held with the stockmen regarding these ordinances.
