

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Navajo County desires to obtain screenings for the purpose of highway maintenance in said Navajo County, and

WHEREAS, the materials desired by Navajo County are located within the boundaries of the reservation more particularly described as follows:

Beginning on a point 550 feet South 30° East of Station 101 of Show Low-McNary Highway. Project No. S-215, thence North 60° East 200 feet, thence South 30° East 1,100 feet; thence South 60° West 500 feet; thence North 30° West 1,100 feet; thence North 60° East 300 feet to point of beginning, and

WHEREAS, the said Navajo County has agreed to pay for the materials removed from the above described area at the rate of three cents (.03) per cubic yard for screenings, and

WHEREAS, this is a fair price for the required materials,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that Navajo County be granted a permit to remove screenings from the above described area paying therefor three cents per cubic yard said permit beginning April 29, 1959 and ending April 29, 1960.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman of the Tribal Council is instructed to sign and the Superintendent of the Fort Apache Agency, Whiteriver, Arizona is requested to execute the necessary permit and other papers for the removal of the above materials in accordance with provisions of Title 25, CFR, as amended and in compliance with provisions contained herewith.

The foregoing resolution was on April 1, 1959 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
