

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


- WHEREAS, The Honorable Senator Carl Hayden has proven himself to be one of Arizona's most imminent Statesmen, and
- WHEREAS, he realizes the great importance of providing adequate, wholesome, self-sustaining recreational facilities for the American public, and
- WHEREAS, through his untiring efforts the Williams Creek Fish Hatchery became a reality, and
- WHEREAS, through his efforts the United States Congress was convinced of the feasibility of constructing another Fish Hatchery and/or Fish Cultural Station upon the land surrounding Alchesay Springs on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe, because of the above reasons, desires to honor this magnanimous person.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the area of land embracing Alchesay Springs on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation approximately eight miles north of Whiteriver, Arizona on the North Fork of the Whiteriver be henceforth known as Carl Hayden Springs, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any Fish Hatchery and/or Cultural Station constructed within said area shall be named Carl Hayden Fish Hatchery and/or Carl Hayden Fish Cultural Station.

The foregoing resolution was on July 1, 1959 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (a) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
