

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, a serious house shortage exists in the Whiteriver area, Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and

WHEREAS, the Superintendent of the Fort Apache Agency is desirous of moving the house trailers from the present temporary location to a permanent one in the compound area, and

WHEREAS, it would be economically feasible for the White Mountain Apache Tribe to construct and maintain a modern trailer court to be operated by the White Mountain Recreation Enterprise,


BE IT RESOLVED that the Superintendent of the Fort Apache Agency is hereby requested to relinquish to the Tribe approximately 4.6 acres of land, said land being described by plat prepared by Chambers and Associates, on file in the Fort Apache Agency Office, to which reference is hereby made.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon said land being relinquished and set aside to the White Mountain Apache Tribe, the Recreation Manager is hereby authorized and directed to present to the Tribal Council a plan of operations and estimated cost of construction of said trailer court for its appropriate action.

The foregoing resolution was on March 1, 1961 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1(i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

Dear Mr. Haverland:

Resolution No. 61-25 requests the Bureau of Indian Affairs to relinquish 4.8 acres of land in order that the White Mountain Recreation Enterprise may construct and operate a trailer court in Whiteriver. At the present time there are numerous trailers parked temporarily on various locations on the administrative site, therefore, we feel it would be economically feasible for the Recreation Enterprise to operate a modern trailer court.

The resolution also authorizes and directs the Manager of the White Mountain Recreation Enterprise to present to the Tribal Council a plan of operation and estimated costs for the construction of the trailer court for their approval.

Resolution No. 61-25 was adopted on March 1, 1961 by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (1) of the Amended Constitution of the Tribe. Under this authority the resolution is not subject to review or approval by the Secretary of the Interior.
