

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the control and eradication of undesirable brush is a major problem on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation and is vital to the economic well being of the reservation livestock industry, and

WHEREAS, the Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station has requested permission to establish two plots, each approximately one acre in size, for the purpose of studying methods and effects of brush and tree eradication, and

WHEREAS, the results of this study will be of direct benefit to the Fort Apache Indian Reservation.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station be granted permission to fence and conduct their studies for a period of ten years on two approximately one acre plots located in the vicinity  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile south of road going to Cedar Mesa from Carrizo Creek immediately west of the cleared area. (Approximate legal description: SW $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$  Sec 7, T7N, R20E).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent and Tribal Chairman be authorized to execute a memorandum of understanding with the Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station to facilitate this study.

The foregoing resolution was on May 3, 1962 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (b) and (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
