

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe maintains an active predatory animal control program to minimize losses of livestock and game animals, and
- WHEREAS, traps and formula 1080 poisons are utilized to reduce the population of coyotes, lions, bobcats and other predators, and
- WHEREAS, the use of hounds or hunting dogs on the reservation is not compatible with the above mentioned program, and
- WHEREAS, difficulty has been experienced in the past with fences being cut by dog hunters and livestock and game being run by dog packs on the reservation.

BE IT RESOLVED that all existing permits to run hunting dogs on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation be cancelled and that the Tribal Game Wardens and Police be instructed to impound any hunting dogs found running at large within the exterior boundaries of the reservation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an impoundment fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) per day be levied against the claimant of any dog impounded under this order and that any dog not claimed within a five day period shall be disposed of.

The foregoing resolution was on June 6, 1962, duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (f) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
