

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe derives most of its income from the sale and manufacturing of timber products, and
- WHEREAS, Canada imports large amounts of timber into the United States at a low price that the White Mountain Apaches cannot compete with, and
- WHEREAS, the President of the United States has vetoed a bill which would have placed an import duty on said timber.
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache cattle industry is depressed because of an oversupply of cattle being imported into United States by foreign countries at great reduced prices.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the Arizona Congressional Delegation be requested to repass said bill providing for an import duty and attempt to secure enough votes to override a presidential veto.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Arizona Congressional Delegation be requested to establish an import duty on cattle.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Arizona Cattle Growers Association be requested to promote breach of legislation establishing quotas on import beef.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to each member of the Arizona Delegation.

The foregoing resolution was on January 8, 1964 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (a) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 964)
