

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Penrod Mountain Fire of June 17, 1964, burned 2,165 acres of timberland, the sawtimber of which is being sold to the highest bidder, and

WHEREAS, there is an estimated stand of fire killed pulpwood sized timber, estimated without cruising, to have a volume of 5,000 cords which even though damaged can be salvaged if sold promptly before spoiling, and

WHEREAS, since there is only one pulp mill in the region, that of Southwest Forest Industries, Inc., there is no purpose in advertising this wood, and

WHEREAS, the operators of the pulp mill who are interested in the wood will have to exercise special handling in the manufacture of this wood into pulp, it is logical that the price be reduced below the current price of \$1.10 per cord for live green pulp timber, and the recommended price for starting negotiations for sale be fifty cents per cord.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Branch of Forestry be authorized to negotiate a contract for the sale of the above-mentioned pulpwood for a price not less than fifty cents per cord.

The foregoing resolution was on July 29, 1964 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
