

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe has a cooperative agreement with the Branch of Predator and Rodent Control, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to effectively control the predatory animal and rodent populations on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and

WHEREAS, the Tribe receives valuable benefits from this program in the form of greater livestock production and increased game harvests, and

WHEREAS, the poison compound known as "1080" has proven to be an effective tool in the predator control program.

BE IT RESOLVED that the District Agent for the Branch of Predator and Rodent Control and the Tribal Trapper be granted authority to treat that portion east of U. S. Highway 60 during the winter of 1964-65 by placing "1080 stations" at locations selected by the Tribal Trapper and agreed upon by the Recreation Manager.

The foregoing resolution was on August 12, 1964 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (f) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
