

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, General Forest Regulations require consent of the Indian owners for the cutting of timber under permit, and the establishment of minimum stumpage rates to be charged and the establishment of rates for miscellaneous forest products, and

WHEREAS, the Regulations also require that an annual policy statement be prepared by the Superintendent on a calendar year basis covering all particulars which is to be approved by the Area Director.


BE IT RESOLVED that the schedule of stumpage rates and prices for the various forest products attached hereto be approved for the Calendar Year 1965, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to expedite the issuance of Form 5-924a, the following named Bureau employees of the Branch of Forestry are designated to act for the Tribal Chairman as Issuing Officer and who also will be the Superintendent's delegated representative as Approving Officers, to-wit:

The foregoing resolution was on February 11, 1965 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (1) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

Minimum Prices

1. Posts, any species (1)	1/2¢	L.F.

Instructions

- (1) Post and pole cutting may be done without supervision in juniper and aspen. No aspen cutting may be done within 300 feet of highways or camping areas. Cutting of conifers should be in down material along logging roads, otherwise marking is required.
- (2) Marking is required. This type of cutting should be avoided as it requires much supervision.
- (3) This type of fuelwood is free to Tribal members and Reservation residents for home use.
- (4), (5) Free to Tribal members for home use.
- (6) Free to Tribal members for home use but is not to be cut from areas under contract. Green oak is not to be cut commercially for fuel.
- (7) Marking required.

General

- (a) Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) is maximum permit value to any one person or organization per year.
- (b) Permits are issued at McNary Forestry Station by agent cashier and at Whiteriver, Forestry office.
- (c) All persons, including Indians, selling any kind of wood must have a peddlers permit from Tribal Business Office, Whiteriver.
- (d) Juniper sawlogs must not be sold at fuelwood price.
- (e) House logs must not be sold as sawlogs.
