

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


WHEREAS, Public Law 86-392, 86th Congress, S. 2268, March 18, 1960, declared that the site for the Theodore Roosevelt School located within the boundaries of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, Arizona, be held by the United States in trust for the White Mountain Apache Tribe, subject to the right of the Secretary of the Interior to use any part of the land and improvements for administrative or school purposes for as long as they are needed for that purpose, and


WHEREAS, there are approximately 33.42 acres which are not needed for school purposes and which contains improvements constructed by various tribal members.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe requests that the following described lands be conveyed to the White Mountain Apache Tribe in order that the land may be assigned to tribal members for homesite purposes.'

Beginning at the quarter corner common to Sections 34 and 35, R. 22 E. T. 5 N.; Gila and Salt River Base Meridian; thence N.89°39'E., a distance of 1,320.0 feet to the true point of beginning; thence N.89°39'E.; a distance of 981.0 feet; thence north, a distance of 1,484.0 feet; thence S.89°39'E., a distance of 981.0 feet; thence south, a distance of 1.484.0 feet; back to the point of beginning. Said area contains 33.42 acres more or less.

The foregoing resolution was on June 2, 1966 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
