FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


WHEREAS, Mara-Lyn, for some two years investigated and studied the history and characteristics of the great Apache Chief Cochise, and observed portraits of his two sons, Nachise Cochise and Taza Cochise, and


WHEREAS, after this study she was able to visualize the physical characteristics and locks of Cochise, and

WHEREAS, Mara-Lyn painted a picture of Cochise and the Tribe is of the opinion that this picture is very similar to the true likeness of Cochise as related to the Tribe's elders by their ancestors observed in many meetings with Cochise.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tribe hereby officially adopts the portrait as painted by Mara-Lyn as the officially recognized picture of the great Apache Chief Cochise.

The foregoing resolution was on September 4, 1968 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
