

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION


WHEREAS, control of coyotes and other predatory animals is necessary to protect livestock and game animals on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and

WHEREAS, surveys have indicated that coyote populations are on the increase on the west side of the reservation, and

WHEREAS, the use of 1080 compound has proven to be the most effective and selective control method.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife be authorized and requested to place approximately forty (40) 1080 control stations on that portion of the Fort Apache Indian reservation lying west of U.S. Highway 60.

The foregoing resolution was on November 6, 1968 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (f) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
