WHEREAS, his work as a teacher at the Theodore Roosevelt Indian School and his accomplishments as Health Educator for the United States Public Health Service have been documented as outstanding, and


WHEREAS, he has made outstanding contributions, through his administration of the "Save The Children Federation" program, to numerous communities and hundreds of individual members of the White Mountain Apache Tribe.


BE IT RESOLVED that the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council herewith expresses its appreciation to Jack Cannon for his dedicated services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Jack Cannon is herewith granted full Tribal Hunting and fishing privileges for as long as he shall remain a resident of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation.

The foregoing resolution was on August 7, 1969 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
