

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife have a cooperative agreement covering the control of predatory animals and rodents on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and


WHEREAS, the use of the compound known as "1080" has proven to be the most effective and economical method in controlling coyotes and certain other predators, and


WHEREAS, such controls are deemed necessary in order to protect livestock and game animals on the Reservation.

BE IT RESOLVED that the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service be requested to treat all of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation east of U. S. Highway 60 with "1080" stations during the fall and winter of 1969.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the number of stations needed and the location of said stations be determined by the Predator Control Agent and the Tribal Game Department.

The foregoing resolution was on November 5, 1969 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (f) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
