

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, there has been several contacts and some correspondence with the Indian Division of Environmental Health, U. S. Public Health Service, in regards to two specific small water and sanitation projects on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council is aware of the great need for a system on the east side of the North Fork of the White River in the town of Whiteriver and three houses near the old Fort Apache Cemetery and southeast of the Theodore Roosevelt Boarding School, and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council has been advised by the Washington Office of the Public Health Service that there are sufficient funds available, and
- WHEREAS, the local representative of the U. S. Public Health Service states that no funds can be made available except for new housing projects.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the Phoenix Area and Washington Offices of the Public Health Service be requested to discuss this urgent need for water and sanitation facilities for these houses already existing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Arizona Congressional Delegation be notified and requested to help get these two projects funded as soon as possible.

The foregoing resolution was on January 26, 1971 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (1) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
